

| Organization | Region/County | Organization Description |
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| AAPI Equity Alliance | Los Angeles | AAPI Equity Alliance (formerly, A3PCON) is a coalition of community-based organizations that advocates for the rights and needs of the Asian and Pacific Islander American community. |
| Action Council of Monterey County, Inc. | Central Coast | Provides mission-driven start-ups the guidance needed to address complex community problems and create social equity change. |
| Alianza Coachella Valley | Inland Empire | Previously known as Building Healthy Communities, their work is built around leadership development and an understanding that healthy and economically prosperous communities exist only when community is represented in all decisions. They work to make people active players in the processes shaping policies and public funding priorities. |
| Anti-Recidivism Coalition | Sacramento, SD, Bay Area, IE, LA | Supports formely incarcerated folks through rehabiltating and transitional programs. Also advocate for a more just criminal legal sysytem. |
| CA Association for Microenterprise Opportunity (CAMEO) | San Francisco | CAMEO is California's statewide micro-business network made up of over 395 organizations, agencies, and individuals dedicated to furthering Micro-Business development in California with small and micro-business financing such as loans and credit, technical assistance and business management training. They build capacity and expand resources for their members. |
| California Calls Education Fund | LA | Convened the Million Voters Project, augment minorities political power. |
| California Heritage Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP) | Sacramento, Nevada | Non-profit guided by the Nevada City Rancheria Tribal Council. With financial and community support, CHIRP seeks to "creatively mimic" programs that will support the preservation, protection and perpetuation of the Nisenan people and their culture into the future, while advocating for the restoration of the Nevada City Rancheria's federal recognition. |
| California Healthy Nail Salon Collaborative (CHNSC) | Bay Area, LA | Founded in 2005, the California Healthy Nail Salon Collaborative is a statewide grassroots organization that addresses health, environmental, reproductive justice, and other social issues faced by its low-income, female, Vietnamese immigrant and refugee workforce. Using a multi-tiered approach that blends community organizing, grassroots policy advocacy, and community-based research, the Collaborative builds power of the nail salon community to develop solutions that benefit the nail salon workforce, their families, small immigrant and refugee owned businesses, and their communities. |
| Central Valley Community Foundation | Central San Joaquin Valley | The only accredited community foundation in the region, they drive strategic investments and offer best-in-class charitable tools to connect donors to the causes they care most about. As a philanthropic financial institution with \$140 Million in assets under management, they partner with the community and multiply every dollar for big, measurable change. |
| Chaffey College Foundation | IE | Two-year community college with three campuses serving San Benardino County. |
| Chinese Progressive Association | Bay Area | Supports working class immigrant Chinese communities in SF through education, organizing, and leadership. |

| Imperial Valley Equity & Justice Coalition | Southern Border, IE | In a county with only one primary-care physician for every 4,410 residents, compared to one for every 1,270 residents statewide, they are committed to building local leadership, expanding capacity and reach, and leading initiatives that reduce inequities among historically excluded Latinx communities. They are advocates for community empowerment, social & environmental justice, and health equity. Their vision is to eliminate health and social disparities and inequities among the Latinx community in Imperial Valley (IV) and build the next generation of Latinx community leaders. |
| Inland Empire Black Worker Center | IE | Builds a united voice and powerful position for Black working class communities in Southern California. |
| Inland Empire Growth & Opportunity (IEGO) | IE | A regional cross-sector, bi-county collaborative, committed to growing middle-class jobs and pursuing inclusive economic development to improve the quality of life for all Riverside and San Bernardino County residents. IEGO's work focuses on building industry clusters in Sustainable Logistics, Cybersecurity, Advanced Manufacturing and Green Technology. |
| Inland Empire Labor Institute (IELI) | ΙΕ | Is the non profit wing of IE Labor Council. IELI partners with economic, social, and environmental organizations to prioritize the needs of workers in uplifting communities and families.
